

Requirements of the CLTS Waiver Program

Monthly collateral contact is required.

Direct contact with the family every three months.

More frequent visits may be required in response to individual needs.

Review individual service plan every six months.

Annual recertification is required to assure the participant's continued eligibility for the waiver program.

There may be a parental payment required. This will be determined at the time of eligibility of the program.

Children's Long Term Support Waiver Program

A Program to Help Children with Disabilities



What is the Children's Long Term Waiver?

The CLTS waivers support an eligible child with disabilities and his/her family with services in the child's home and community.

The CLTS waivers are Medicaid Home and Community-Based Service Waivers. These were started as a method for Medicaid to fund the integration of people with disabilities into the society as large instead of function more restrictive and costly institutional placements.

The CLTS Waiver was developed to provide more appropriate services and supports for children with long-term care needs.

The CLTS waiver went into effect January 4th, 2004 and is now being offered through Crawford County Health & Human Services.

Who is Eligible?

The child has to have a diagnosis in one of the target groups: Physically Disabled, Developmentally Disabled, or Emotionally Disabled.

The Child must meet the waiver-eligibility level of care; this is determined by the functional screen.

The child must meet the non-financial and financial eligibility criteria for Medicaid.

The child resides in an eligible living situation.

The child meets required Wisconsin residency and is a Crawford Co. resident.

The child is determined to need Medicaid waiver services.



Services

Services are developed on an individual, child and family-centered basis. CWA social worker works with the family to identify supports and services that would be most beneficial for the child and family. After the plan of services is developed, the social worker works with the family to help implement services as well as assess their ongoing effectiveness.

Possible Services Include

- Adaptive Aids
- Consumer and Family-Directed Supports
- Consumer Education and Training
- Counseling and Therapeutic Resources
- Daily Living Skills
- Respite Care
- Supportive Home Care

This program does not fund any experimental or aversive services.
